Our School District

On June 1, 1998, six elementary districts (North Bend #8, Morse Bluff #14, Webster #27, Ames #91, Dodge Co. #92, and Cotterell #93) reorganized with North Bend Central High School District #95 to form a new Class III (K-12) 2007 school system. The new North Bend Central Public School's District operated with six elementary attendance centers and one high school building during the 1998-99 school year. Webster and Ames four elementary attendance centers and the junior-senior high school. Cotterell Elementary closed at the end of the 2000-01 school year and Tower Elementary was closed at the

end of 2001-02. With the opening of the new elementary addition in January, 2004, Morse Bluff Elementary was closed. All K-6 students now attend North Bend Central Elementary School located at 420 East 11th St. Students in Grades 7-12 attend North Bend Central Junior-Senior High School. It's campus is located at 14th and Walnut Streets. Two classrooms were added to North Bend Elementary in 2008.

The school district covers 228 square miles and had an official enrollment of 464 students in 2007-08. One student was contracted to a special school for Special Education services.

North Bend Central Public Schools is accredited by the Nebraska Department of Education and, since 1917, the high school has also been accredited by the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. Currently the high school is classified as "C-1" by the Nebraska School Activities Association in most activities and is a member of the East Husker Conference. The Board of Education

North Bend Central Public Schools is governed by an elected six-member Board of Education. Regular meetings are held the second Monday of each month. The Board was appointed by the Dodge County Reorganization Committee in 1998 with three members assigned two-year terms and three assigned four-year terms. Since then, three members have been elected to four-year terms.

Learning Climate/ Graduate Follow-Up Study

A faculty committee prepared the annual learning climate survey and graduate follow-up study. The learning climate surveys, about 15 questions each, were administered to faculty and staff and students in Grades 3, 6, 8, 11 and their parents in March.

Two questions of particular interest at all grade levels involved whether instruction is challenging and whether schools are perceived as safe. Although worded differently at different levels, one statement noted that classes are challenging and/or expectations are high. Responses were:

II. STATEWIDE WRITING ASSESSMENT (2008)

In February, 2008, students in Grades 4,8,11 took the Statewide Writing Assessment. The results showed that 78% of NB-CPS fourth graders, 89% of eighth graders, and 93% of eleventh graders met the state standard. Statewide averages will be available in November.

III. LOCAL ACHIEVEMENT *TESTING* (2008)

In April, 2008, students in Grades 3-9 and 11 were given the California Achievement Test (CAT). These are norm-referenced tests meaning that NBCPS students are compared to students nationwide. On norm-referenced tests, 50 is the national average. The 50th percentile is the point at which half of the students tested nationally scored above and half scored at or below. Example: students in Grade 4 had a percentile score in Total Language of 59. That means that of the national group, 41% scored higher and 59% scored the same or lower. Several sub-tests are given. The chart below summarizes Language, Math and the Battery Total. Grade 10 students take a pre-college test called PLAN. The average national percentile scores for PLAN are listed below also.

IV. AMERICAN COLLEGE TEST (ACT)

Another measure of student achievement is the American College Test (ACT). This test is not given to all students, only to those high school juniors and seniors who wish to take it. In 2007-08, 35 of 48 NBC seniors (72.9%) took the ACT. This compares to about 77% of seniors in Nebraska overall. Their best average score through the June, 2008 testing and last 5 years are listed below. Maximum score on the ACT is 36.

V. STARS READING

The State Board of Education has established statewide standards in reading/language arts, mathematics, science and social studies. In 2007-08, reading and math assessments were again conducted in Grades 4, 8, and 11. Here's how our students performed over the last three years. Students in the "Begining and "Progressing" catgories have not yet met the state standards. Those in the "Proficient" and "Advanced" categories have met the state standards.

VI. FEDERAL ADEQUATE YEARLY PROGRESS (AYP)

The federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires schools to make progress annually toward 100% proficiency in reading and math. Nebraska schools measure Adequate Teacher Progress (ATP) in grades 3, 8, and 11. In 2006-07, North Bend Central Public Schools met all AYP indicators and inital results for 2007-08 show NBCPS meeting all AYP standards once again. A full report will be available in December,
